Remember, WE'RE ONLY TRACKING COMMUTER MILEAGE. If you decide to join the group, you should only log rides that are legitimate commutes--trips that you could've taken by automobile but chose to ride your bicycle. Please don't log training rides or mileage accrued on LBC rides. Riding to and from club rides would count as a commute, but not the mileage on the ride itself.

There will be no LBC Awards associated with the Commuter Program. There will be no "Winner" for most Commuting Mileage. We appreciate folks commuting and taking the time to log their rides.

Who were these early bicycle riders? Most were young men, ages 16 to 25, and most were unmarried as a wife or family is never mentioned but in nearly every weekly column someone is teased about his pursuit of a young lady. Here is a collection of stories taken from a year's worth of

Louisville Commercial Bicycle Notes cycling columns, all written by Orville Anderson. Remember? He was one of the two pioneer century riders. The year was 1882 and the bicycle gave the Louisville lads a freedom never experienced before. Here is what they were up to.

"The Nashville girls are mashed on the shape of one of the Louisville riders. He uses a 56 inch machine but his name cannot be mentioned."

"The wheelmen are invited out to Fern Creek to a strawberry fair. Cake will be served as will strawberries and cream and the attraction of the young ladies themselves."

The boys began naming their bicycles after their sweethearts; Will Franke calls his bike "Betty; Mr. Dietzman, Nellie; Mr. Dunekake, "Minnie"; Mr. Haupt, "Lena"; G. Franke, "Emma C." to name a few.

"A young lady – a beautiful young lady, with a face as perfectly beautiful as the angels we sometimes dream of - sat on the lower seat watching the two-mile race, "Oh" she said, clasping her hands, "I do hope he will win." The second time the racers came around, Orville Anderson fell. Tears came to her eyes and she turned away. Who was she Anderson?"

"There are lots of pretty girls in Portland, and they are partial to bicyclers; when they hear that the boys are coming down, they find it absolutely necessary to sweep the front pavement."

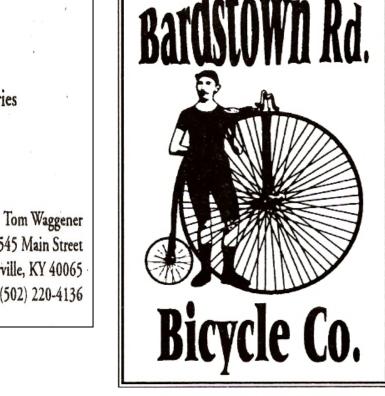

On Sunday, September 30, 2012 I left Clarkson, Kentucky for my annual bicycle trip. I usually take my trips in the northwest United States because the weather is hot and dry during the day and nice and cool at night, providing great sleeping conditions. My 2011 trip from Edmonton, Alberta, Canada to Kalispell, Montana proved to be expensive getting me and my bike to Edmonton, so I decided to stay close to home in 2012.

On that cool Sunday morning I left for my day one destination, Bowling Green, Kentucky. Riding towards Bowling Green, I traveled through Amish Country. Two ways to tell you're in Amish Country: one, horse manure; and two, the roughness in the middle of the road where the horses' hooves hit.

My route also took me through Mammoth Cave National Park. Coming from my direction I had to take the free, ten-second ferry ride across the Green River. I then had a 2.5 mile climb up to the main drag of the park. That time of year the leaves were changing which made the ride even prettier. I continued south

through Smith Grove and Oakland before ending up at my final destination for the day, Bowling Green.

I set up camp at the expensive K.O.A. From my experiences, I try to avoid K.O.A. because they are the most expensive campgrounds. Most campgrounds give cyclists a break, but not KOA. Monday, day two, Lake Barkley State Park was my

destination. One slight problem: I woke up to a steady rain. Loaded up in a rain suit, I headed out. I took U.S. 68/Kv. 80 which is a 4lane road with a wide shoulder. Did I mention it was raining, all 108 miles? When I arrived that evening I had to set up camp in the rain.

Tuesday morning, the start of day three, I woke up to a

drizzle. I continued on U.S. 68/Ky. 80 before stopping at the Last Chance store. I think it was named this because it's the last chance for liquor in quite a while. In fact, I didn't have a beer until I got home. You might remember this is the area in which the boat hit the bridge which caused the bridge to shut down for about 5 months. It caused a lot of problems for people going to work or school in Murray.

I headed north on "The Trace", the road that goes through the Land Between the Lakes. I pretty much had the road to myself, stopping in Grand Rivers for lunch and continuing north to Smithland, Kentucky, an Ohio River town. I then headed east to my destination, Birdsville. The only thing in Birdsville today is the campground. It used to be a town but time took its toll. That night I camped about 25 yards from the Ohio River. As I was setting up my tent I noticed that the barges stopped in front of the campground, waited for a while, and then proceeded on. I was told this is a holding point for barges waiting for permission to pass through the locks.

I woke up on a sunny Wednesday morning; something I hadn't seen in awhile, and headed up river, thinking it was going to be flat. Wrong. About a mile down the road I had a brutal ¾ mile climb up from the river valley. I continued on to Marion where I stopped for lunch.

A couple of ladies told me about a church in Clay, Kentucky that takes in cyclists for free. My next destination, Clay and the United Memorial Methodist Church. I slept in the youth group room with a welcomed roof over my head, bathroom, and shower.

Another sunny morning waited when I left Clay on Thursday. Destination: Utica, Kentucky.

Riding back roads with minimal traffic, I continued on to Utica. I was told that the firehouse lets you camp for free or lets you sleep inside the firehouse if there are not that many needing shelter. During this stretch of the trip I meet a guy from Australia who was headed to Mobile, Alabama, a couple from Utah, and one from Florida, all staying at the firehouse.

On Friday morning we woke up to another sunny day. This was the last day of my trip, but the others were heading to Virginia.

We parted ways a few miles east of Fordsville, Kentucky. I rolled into Embry's Bike Shop in Leitchfield on Friday afternoon to meet my ride back home.

I ended up with 461 miles for the six days that I rode. I would do it again but I would continue west to the Mississippi River. This part of the state is even more rural.

### 2012 Banquet Report

Despite losing our Advocacy Vice President and several award winners to the flu, the 2012 LBC Awards banquet, held January 19, 2013 had near record attendance of 174 at Big Spring Country Club. This year's banquet was a fun-filled night that featured some new twists: photography by club member/professional photographer Eric Graf, a free photo booth operated by Thomas Nance, some special recognition awards, and a host of cool stuff given away as door prizes.

The club put its best foot forward with it's registration crew, the lovely and talented Laurie Murphy, Susan Howell, Cathy Hill, Lise Andreasen and Dianna Decker. Check-in went very smoothly thanks to these ladies, and the fact that all but 4 attendees pre-registered online.

During cocktails, members were treated to a video of photos taken over the year, and pulled together by our Gizmo, Larry Preble. A host of noteworthy guests were present, including; Bob Peters from Clarksville Schwinn, Ben Botkins from Parkside Bikes, Carson & Alison Torpey from Bardstown Road Bicycle Co., Rolf & Elizabeth Eisinger from Bike Louisville, Dirk Gowin from Metro Public Works & Assets, Scott & Erica Render from the Mayor's Office, Stacy Funk & Jerika Amos from the MS Society, Dan Delph from Bike To Beat Cancer, Joan Hanscom, Keegan Schelling, Joe Czerwonka & Whitney Vogel from the USGP of Cyclocross.

The night began with two very special presentations. The first was to Bob Peters, owner of Clarksville Schwinn, for his

support of cycling, and in recognition of his attendance at his 40th LBC banquet. The other special presentation was to Stewart Prather, our club counsel. Stewart was the father/founder of the OKHT, and this was the 35th year for that event which means so much to the club. Because of OKHT, the club has enough money to operate each year, and is also able to donate to local charities.

Andy said some other things; The great job being done by our statistician, Ron Deprez was noted and is most appreciated! Special thanks were extended to the MS Society and Bike to Beat Cancer groups for their support of the 2012 OKHT.

Membership in the club is at 1178. The LBC Commuting Program continues its steady pace. Our Wayside Park Adoption is entering its 4th year. The LBC Education Program continues to grow--a record 60 graduates this past year! The LBC has a large contingent of volunteers at local bike races. The National High Wheel Meet will be June 21-25, 2013. The UCI Masters and Elite Cyclocross World Championships will be contested in Louisville, January 29-February 3, 2013.

Andy also noted the great number of door prizes to be given away by random drawing during the night: 4 buckets of bike cleaning supplies; 4 Topeak Pro premium bicycle pumps; a bucket of tools and goodies from Main St. Bikes valued at \$150; 4 Park Tool deluxe multi-tools; many pairs of \$45 tickets to the Cyclocross World Championship; \$100 gift certificates to Main St. Bikes and Bardstown Road Bicycles; \$250 gift

certificates to Clarksville Schwinn and Parkside Bicycles; and a fully equipped saddle bag with tools/tubes.

Dianna Decker then presented the minutes of the 2011 banquet via a special music video that made the reading of the minutes the most fun in the history of the club! The minutes were unanimously approved!

Next, the Treasurer's financial report was presented. When all was said and done, the club had a surplus for the year of about \$4,700, and the race team a deficit of \$2,200. A final, more detailed financial report will be published in the newsletter in the coming months.

Mark then presented an overview of the Top Ten projects undertaken in 2012, as shown in the slides that follow. The two most significant items were the creation of an LBC Online Store for LBC merchandise, and allowing online registration for OKHT. Steve Rice did all the technical work behind the scenes to get these two items operational. Another important item was the ability to take credit cards for payment through a credit card reader attached to an iPad.

Other projects, completed or in process, are: the creation of a Hall of Fame on our website, which contains all our historical data regarding officers and award winners; a Secretary's Corner on the website containing approved minutes from LBC meetings; a financial review of the clubs records, and the bringing together of old and new Quicken files to create one continuous database of finances from 2007 to the present.

Mark then presented the proposed amendment to the bylaws and discussed the reasons for it. The club has not always received all of the records that its volunteers and officers created in the performance of their duties, and the club had to recently hire an attorney to retrieve some of its records. In order to refute any private claims to these kinds of records in the future, club counsel and our outside attorney drafted the amendment, which requires that all records, electronic or otherwise, be returned to the club within 15 days.

Susan Howell, chair of the nominating committee, which included Donna Connell and Kirk Roggenkamp, then conducted the voting portion of the meeting. No alternate candidates were nominated; current officers were unanimously reelected by voice vote. The amendment then passed unanimously also.

The awards portion of the evening followed led by Travis Kerns, Racing VP, who presented Racer of the Year to Chris Coslow, and Racing Volunteer of the Year to Andy Murphy.

The remainder of the awards portion of the evening was conducted by VP Touring Charlie Drexler, with a couple of new recognitions. Charlie noted that a record 797 riders completed 17,125 rides, amassing a total of 619,837 miles! Ride captains put on 1240 rides in 2012. 10 Ride Captains were eligible to receive Ride Captain Jerseys this year. Charlie also noted that 59 riders completed 5 centuries or more during the year, with Melissa Hall topping all with 34.

For the first time, the club acknowledged the six club members who completed the entire brevet series in 2012, consisting of

200K, 300K, 400K, and 600K rides. Absent were Bill Pustow and Steve Royse.

A special recognition went to Rita and Steve Sarson and Deb and Steve Sexton, who have staffed the first Sunday SAG stop on OKHT for 10 years, providing a lot of enjoyment to everyone with their themed station. They are retiring from that role, and the club acknowledged their great contributions to the OKHT by also naming them OKHT Volunteers of the Year.

Touring Awards this year were:

- Most Improved Riders: Male, Don Snow and Female, Kim Stanton
- Yellow Jersey winners: Paul Battle and Kelly McGill
- Masters (Blue) Jersey winners were Vicky Dobbs and Larry Preble.
- Tim Chilton was awarded the 75,000 Lifetime Miles award.
- 50,000 Lifetime Miles awards were given to George Cooper, Larry Preble, Steve Rice, Ian Schill and Steve Sarson.
- 25,000 Lifetime Miles awards were given to Allison Dobbs, Kathy Doran, Scott Howes, Joe Medley, Andy Murphy and Larry Myers.

Also new this year, were awards for best new rides in three categories: under 35 miles, 36-66 miles and over 66 miles. Cathy Hill and Kirk Roggenkamp won both the shorter ride awards with their Child's Place ride and Morgan's Raid ride. Mike Kamenish won the over 66 mile ride with his new High Bridge Century. Plaques and gift certificates were presented.

Dave King unveiled the beautiful new Tour de Mad Dog jersey designed by Steve Rice. Dave awarded a jersey to Steve in recognition of his design efforts over the last 6 years. Dave then presented the TMD Yellow jersey awards to Ford Barr and Cathy Hill. White jersey winners (best new TMD riders) were Ron Oliver and Liz Cull. Dave Combs took the traditional Lantern Rouge for last place finisher. Mike Kamenish will be taking over the directorship of the Tour de Mad Dog from Dave King, who has done a great job in that role the last two years.

At the end of the evening, everyone who volunteered in a significant way during the year: captains of over 10 rides, helpers at Wayside Park, and those who worked OKHT or volunteered at local bicycle races, the Mayor's Ride etc, were each acknowledged by either a towel and pair of sox combo, an LBC mug, or a gift certificate to a local bike shop. With all that, we were still done before 10 pm, tired and happy, and ready for a new year of riding.

Thank you, everyone, for a wonderful 2012! We look forward to 2013!




